Lakelands Academy - A guide to our school uniform

Dear Parent/Guardian,

We are very proud of our appearance here at Lakelands, and we know that wearing school uniform helps to promote a strong, cohesive, school identity that supports our high standards. Our pupils tell us that wearing their Lakelands uniform removes any dilemma about what to wear each day, and that it gives them a sense of belonging. Importantly, in a world where young people are under increasing pressure, uniform creates a judgement free zone, where everyone is equal. This leaves them free to be able to concentrate on the important business of learning and allows them to make the most of their time with us.

Getting pupils back to school has been a stressful and worrying time for many of us. All of our current focus and energy has to be on teaching our pupils and keeping everyone safe. Unwanted distractions or conflict around uniform and appearance is something we are really keen to avoid. At Lakelands, we feel that despite the current challenges we all face, maintaining our high standards of uniform and appearance is still important. We regularly receive comments on the smartness of our pupils and we believe that having well-presented students will result in good behaviour, a sense of pride belonging to the Lakelands family and a good work ethic which prepares pupils for the world of work. We strive to maintain our high standards.

Shops sell a huge range of products under the banner of school uniform, and we know how convincing our children can be, persuading us that a particular item is acceptable, when it isn't! Uniform is a significant expense for families, particularly during secondary school years when children are growing so much, and we realise that no-one wants to have to buy more than they need to.

Over the years, we have taken on board comments that more clarity would be appreciated, and we've also listened to our parents who have asked us to consider easy supply and purchasing options (online and in store). In drawing up our uniform guide we have decided NOT to follow some other local schools who are limiting parents' choice to just one supplier for their school uniform

The uniform guide and appearance code explains the range of 'Lakelands approved' uniform options from which parents can choose. **(this is available on our website and the appearance code also appears on Page 3 on your child's school planner)**

Over the past week, form tutors and Heads of Year have done uniform and appearance checks. They found that there are still a number of issues/concerns with a minority of pupils including.....

- Pupils wearing tight Lycra type leggings instead of school trousers or skirts
- skirts that are too tight and too short
- trousers that are too short, so ankles are showing
- pupils wearing more than one simple plain gold or silver stud in each ear.
- **Pupil should NEVER be wearing nose piercings.**
- Pupils wearing false eyelashes and false nails
- Only pupils in year 11 can wear "minimal" make up
- Pupils arriving in trainers instead of school shoes
- Pupils arriving in PE kit when they haven't got a PE lesson that day.

When pupils return in January, form tutors and Heads of Year will carry out uniform and appearance checks. If there is an issue with appearance you may see a sticker has been placed in your child's school planer alerting you what the issue is, there may be letter/parentmail or phone call home.

We always want to work in partnership with parents, so if you don't think you will be able to make the necessary purchases in time for the new term, please contact your child's Head of Year via school admin when we start back in January, to discuss the matter in strict confidence. We will do everything we can to support you. If your son/daughter is unable to wear the full uniform for exceptional medical reasons, again, please notify the Head of Year in writing via school email.

We keep uniform items from across the range, and in all sizes, to store in school. These will not be for sale but will be held centrally so that we can support students who have a mishap during the day or who arrive at school wearing inappropriate uniform. Students will be able to borrow these school issue garments (which will always be freshly laundered) but will be asked to return them the following day.

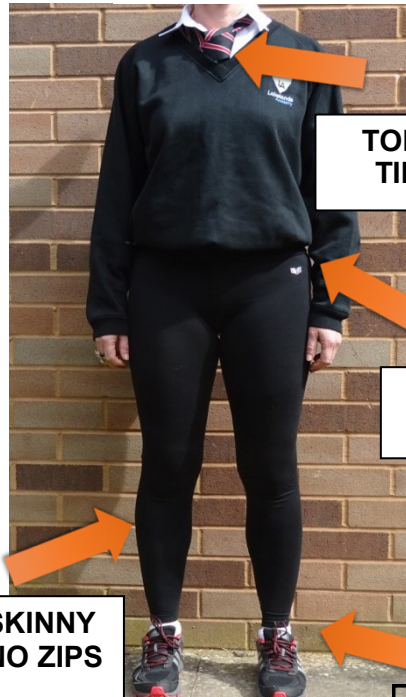

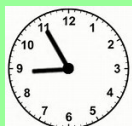
REPORTING AN ABSENCE

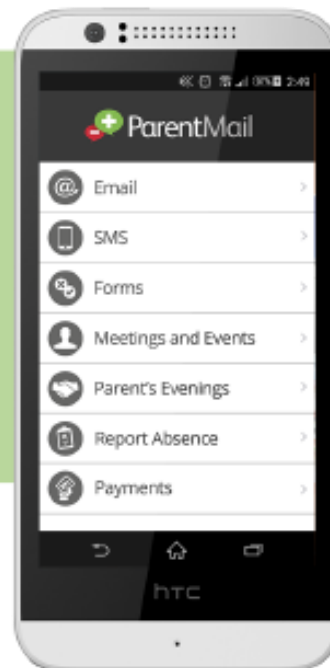
